NEW STUDENT WORRIES

LEARNING INSIDE THE CLASSROOM

— Is it harder? How about the workload in high school? This is something your classmates are probably worried about, too.

The work in high school builds on what you learned in middle school, giving you a more advanced knowledge of many academic subjects. You may find that you have more work to do or that it's a bit more challenging. These challenges can make you feel less bored with the usual routine — it feels great when you've mastered something really tough. Maybe you'll find a new appreciation for biology or discover a passion for literature.

If you ever find your work too overwhelming, teachers and tutors are available for extra help. While you have more independence as a high school student than you might have had in middle school, there are still many resources to fall back on if you feel the work is too much.

LEARNING OUTSIDE THE CLASSROOM

High school is a time of increasing independence and responsibility. As in middle school, you or your friends may encounter some tough times. But if you ever find that personal issues get overwhelming, find someone to talk to. Just because you're becoming more independent does not mean you're alone.

Friends and parents can be great resources, but sometimes that's not enough. School counselors can be very helpful if you want to talk with someone outside of your friends and family. So many people are available to help you.

BEING A BALANCED STUDENT


As a high school student, you will soon realize that high school has much more to offer. Thus, you have to learn to try new things, find what you're good at, and stay balanced.

Being on time seems to always be a hard thing for students to understand. **YOU HAVE 7 MINUTES IN BETWEEN CLASSES.** That's plenty of time for you to use the restroom, go to your locker, and get to class on time. Some students tend to use those 6 minutes for personal obligations such as catching up on the latest gossip.

Students try to use distance as an excuse by saying, "Well, I have to walk from Room 1 to the 2nd floor of the Math and Science Building on the other side of campus. It's not enough time!" It didn't work for the students before you, and it's not going to work for you either. Every year before school starts, the principals test the bell schedule to make sure students can walk from one side of campus to another on time. Just do yourself a favor and get to class on time that way you can go to school activities such as games, dances, and even exemptions from exams at each semester. It pays off to be on time.

What is a Tardy? A tardy is when a student enters a class after the bell has rung. **Note: After the first 15 minutes of class it is changed to an absence instead of tardy.

Three (3) or more tardies in a semester is considered excessive. Excessive tardies will result in further disciplinary action.

HOMEWORK

Do algebra problems 15 through 25. Conjugate the verbs on page 50 of your French workbook. Read pages 12 through 20 of the Shakespeare play, and when you're finished with that, don't forget to fill in the missing chemical symbols on the Periodic Table of Elements worksheet.

Sound like your homework for the next few nights — or maybe even just for tonight? Homework is a major part of going to school: It's your teachers' way of evaluating how much you understand of what's going on in class, and it helps reinforce important concepts.

MAKING HOMEWORK LESS WORK.

Luckily, there are several things you can do to make homework less work.

First, be sure you understand the assignment. Write it down in your notebook or day planner if you need to, and don't be afraid to ask questions about what's expected. Although you may hope that things will get easier or that the explanation to the geometry theorems will magically appear in your dreams, most of the time this doesn't happen. It's much easier to take a minute to ask the teacher during or after class than to struggle to remember later that night!

Second, use any extra time you have in school to work on your homework. Many classes have study time that allow students to study or get homework done. It's tempting to hang out with friends during study or unstructured time, but the more work you can get done in school; the less you'll have to do that night.

Third, pace yourself. If you don't finish your homework during school, think about how much you have left and what else is going on that day, and then budget your time. Some high school students have between 1 and 3 hours of homework a night. If it's a heavy homework day and it seems like you've got an assignment in every subject but gym and lunch, you'll need to devote more time to homework. It's a good idea to come up with some kind of homework schedule, especially if you are involved in sports or activities or have an after-school job.

HOMEWORK TIPS

Here's a quick checklist of things that can help you focus:

I know your deadlines.

DO make a calendar of stages and final due dates.

DO understand the assignment and expectations.


DO give yourself a quiet place to study with all the materials you need.

DO give yourself brief breaks.

 ${f DON^*T}$ put work off until the last minute; you'll be too frantic to focus.

 $\mathbf{DON'T}$ do your homework late at night or in bed.

DON'T let yourself be bored; find the aspect of the project or paper that interest you — if you're dying of boredom, something's not right.





Note-taking is a skill that can help you do well on all your schoolwork — everything from taking tests to researching a paper. But unfortunately, most schools don't have classes that teach you how to take notes. So here are some tips.

Awrite Down KEY FACTS. If you have a teacher who writes notes on the board, that's a bonus: You can copy them down. If not, write down the most important points from class. Does your history teacher mention the date of a key Civil War battle? Does your English teacher give examples of Shakespeare's use of dramatic irony? Does your math teacher go over a particular formula? Write it down! It can take some experimenting to figure out what information really is helpful, so keep trying and don't give up. Different teachers do things differently. For example, some teachers may mention lots of dates and facts in class but only write the key ones on the board. Other teachers may not write anything down, but they may repeat a certain date or piece of information. That's a clue that it's probably important. After a while, you'll get to know a teacher's style.

- **DON'T OVERDO IT.** Don't go crazy taking notes, though: You'll be frantic if you try to write down every word that's said in class. If you focus too much on getting your notes right, you might miss important points. Some people actually learn better by listening, writing down a few key points, and then going over the material after class when they have more time.
- **ASK.** Don't be afraid to ask the teacher to repeat something you miss. If the teacher's going too fast, chances are your classmates will also be relieved to hear the information again. If you don't want to ask in class, see your teacher afterwards. It's much easier than wondering if you got the notes right as you study.
- **IV. COMPARE.** Keep your notes handy when you're doing your reading assignments. Compare what you wrote with what the readings say you may even want to add to your notes as you read.
- **COPY.** Depending on how neat your handwriting is, you may want to recopy your notes when you get home. If you've taken notes in a hurry, you're more likely to figure out an unreadable word or sentence on the day of the lesson than you are weeks later when you look back over your notes in preparation for a test.
- **VI. ORGANIZE.** Keep notes for each subject in one place so you can find everything easily when it comes time for a test. That may mean keeping a notebook or section of a notebook for each subject as you take notes in class.

Good note-taking requires extra time and organization. It may help if you think of the time you spend reviewing notes as an investment. For example, if you decide to recopy your notes each evening, you'll probably have less time to watch TV or IM friends, but you'll save time later when it comes to studying for the actual test. Note-taking gives your mind a chance to absorb the material it needs to learn. Not only can this help you to do better on a test, it's also a great confidence booster when you're studying and find yourself saying, "Hey, I remember that."

WHY WORK ON GOOD RELATIONSHIPS WITH TEACHERS?

Your algebra teacher wears clothes from 1985 and always mispronounces your name. Your English teacher loves to start classes with pop quizzes. It can be hard to think of these givers of grades as real people. But they eat pizza, watch movies, and enjoy sports on the weekends, just like you.

SO HOW CAN YOU GET ALONG WITH YOUR TEACHERS?

A good relationship with a teacher today may help you in the future. You will need teachers' written recommendations to apply to a college or for a job after high school. And if you're thinking about going into a career in science, who better to ask about the field than your science teacher?


Teachers are often into the community and may be the first to find out about local competitions, activities, or contests. They also may know about grants and scholarships.


Teachers are often asked to appoint students to student offices or they may recommend students as volunteers for special community programs. All of these activities can help you get into college or get a good job.

CELL PHONES ARE A NO-NO!

So, you're in class and your teacher is giving the most boring lecture over the structure of a human cell. You should take out your phone and start texting, right? Wrong. Teachers know that most kids have a cell phone on them during the day, and keep a close eye out. Even when you think you're not obvious, you are. When they see you "Looking down at the ground," they know something's up.

STUDENT SUPPLIES: Students are required to bring paper, pencils, pens, and other items as required by teachers for specific subjects. A list of required supplies will be provided during the first week of the course.

BACKPACK BASICS

Should I have one binder for all my subjects? Do I need a locker? Being at a new school you're not quite sure on what's the easiest route to take when it comes to preparing for each class. Here's what we suggest.

We encourage you to purchase a 1 in. binder for EACH class (unless a teacher specifically requests differently). That way you have a binder for that class where you can take notes, keep graded papers, etc. Many students like "color coding" their binders. For example, you may want to consider your A day classes to be an Orange binder, and allow your B day classes to be something different such as black.

Another good idea is to buy a simple folder with pockets to keep your homework in. That way when you get home after a long day, you can open your homework folder and it's all in one place. This way you don't forget about an assignment because it's all together.

Do you really need a locker? That is your decision. Some students like them, and others don't. Most students use their backpacks as their "portable locker." They keep all their needs such as binders and books for that day in their backpack, and simply switch-out between days.

If you haven't already noticed being organized is the key to your success in high school. Using those simple tips, can help you start the school year off right.

Each day of the week has a designated dress up day that leads up to Game Day. Friday morning brings the legendary **BACON FRY**. The students gather in the courtyard (outside the cafeteria) for free bacon, eggs, and orange juice.

Friday is also extreme **ORANGE** day. All students are encouraged to wear orange. On Friday morning, students participate in face painting, orange hair spray, and other activities. At 3:00 students head to the gym for the pep rally. The Game is alternated between Arkansas and Texas home stadiums each year, and will be the most exciting game of the year. You don't want to MISS IT!

SPRING OLYMPIAD

The Olympic Games were created within the Shadow of Mt. Olympus in ancient Greece, right? **WRONG!** It all started when a group of students came together in pursue of the title **CHAMPION** of Texas High School. Thus, the Spring Olympiad was born. Every year during the month of May, Texas High holds the Spring Olympiad. Students come together and create teams of 15 people to participate in a variety of random games such as egg toss, crab walk, and so much more. Teams must agree on a name, and create a "jersey" that each member must wear. After competing in the random games, the two teams with the highest total of points compete in the final game. The final game is usually a "deadly" game of dodge ball or tug-o-war. Make sure to bring friends, family, and most importantly your game face-because now there's only one thing to say, "**LET THE GAMES BEGIN!**"

POWDER PUFF FOOTBALL

One day. One game you don't want to miss. Powder Puff Football is a Texas Tradition that occurs every May. It's not your ordinary football game. It's completely opposite. The senior girls play against the junior girls in the game of a lifetime. Guys, don't worry, we have roles for you! Since, the girls are playing football the cheerleading and Drill Team spots are open for tryouts. Freshman and sophomore guys become members dressed in the sparkling uniforms of the Texas Highsteppers, and junior and senior guys dress up in wigs and wear cheerleading skirts. It's loads of fun, and definitely gives you the "TAKE A WALK IN MY SHOES FEELING."

HOMECOMING

"It's an autumn evening in Texarkana, and Texarkana is the whole world. It's Homecoming Night, the backdrop to the time of students' lives. The "fellas" are looking spiffy in their suits, and the girls are giggling their way through a Texas High Tradition."

Even if you don't want to go to the dance, the week is filled with events for you to enjoy. One of our most famous events is B.Y.O.B (Bring Your Own Banana). Everyday during lunch, Student Council will sell Ice Cream for \$1 allowing you to have a "sweet treat." Homecoming Week at Texas High builds up to the crowning of the Homecoming Queen at the Friday night game through a series of themed days – such as Greek Day, Hippy Day, and Hillbilly Day.



Thursday is the day of the pep rally in Tiger Center at 6:30 followed by a "Texas sized" bonfire at 7:00. Bonfires have followed the Homecoming pep rally for years. On Thursday night, the fire is roaring, cheerleaders are cheering, and the smell of pepperoni pizza being sold by the prom moms wafts by. Students sit on the grass, run around, and just hangout.

On Friday, if you have a date to the dance, you and your date exchange mums that you can wear to school and to the football game. Before the football game Friday night, the maids, escorted by their parents, are presented to the fans. The bleachers are awash with orange and white.

On Saturday of Homecoming Week, students experience the first school dance of the year. Girls are dressed waiting for their prince charmings to arrive looking "spiffy" in their suits. Couples usually go out to eat with other couples, and go to the dance together which is held from 7:00-10:00.

Sadie Hawkins dance was in March 1974 and has been a favorite Texas High tradition. Girls, homecoming is all about you, but Sadie Hawkins is all about the guys. It's the girl's responsibility to ask a guy to the dance. Most girls think of creative ideas on how to ask their date such as a sticky note on their guys' car, scavenger hunts, but whatever you do . . . Don't be shy! It may seem like a lot of work, but it's loads of fun! Another great thing about Sadie Hawkins is it's VERY casual (usually jeans and a t-shirt). You and your date need to get together and go shopping for matching shirts to wear to the dance. Girls always buy some sort of crazy stuffed animal or toy for their date. On Saturday of the dance, get a group of friends, go out to eat, and head to the dance where you can "Get-Hitched", take photos, and, of course, dance the night away.



OUR HISTORY . . .

The first classes of Texas High school's history were held in the fall of 1889 at a school built for grades 7 through 11. A small rectangular frame building, it was located on Spruce street between Sixth and Seventh Streets adjacent to a recently opened elementary school.

The first graduating class in 1890 had three students: Eugenia Reed, Nina Trigg, and Jack Trigg. A photograph of the very ornate diploma presented to Miss Reed (Mrs. S. A. Collom, Sr.) now hangs in the Board Room of the Texarkana ISD Administration Building.

As the 20th century began, growth in Texarkana and high school enrollment necessitated a larger and more modern building located at 16th and Maple (now Texas Blvd.). Citizens approved a bond issue for construction of a modern facility which was occupied in 1910.

In the 1920s enrollment increased and additional facilities were again required. The new building, located at 1915 Pine Street, was completed in 1930. Also completed that year was the Texas Public Schools Auditorium. Other facilities were added as the enrollment continued to grow: Tiger Gym, a cafeteria, band hall, and the B. B. Lawson Science Building.

In 1953 the Texarkana Junior College Building at the corner of Sixteenth and Pine Street was donated to the Texas High School and was immediately put to use to accommodate the growing enrollment.

In a 1963 interview, the superintendent stressed the need for a high school facility to serve the 1,100 students since the 1930 building was designed to serve 500.

In 1965 a \$3,000,000-bond issue for a new high school on Kennedy Lane, just west of Summerhill Road, was approved. Designed by world-famous architects Caudill-Rowlett-Scott and local architects Moore and Thomas, the school provides students, teachers, and administrators made-to-order spaces for a broad-based educational program.

Within the last few years, Texas High School has received rapid growth through the building of a Math & Science Building, the Indoor Multi-Purpose Building, and the Sullivan Performing Arts Center home to the John Thomas Theatre.

TROCHIA & TITUS

In the early 1960s, a live tiger from the zoo was used as a mascot and brought onto the football field as part of the festivities of the game. However, all that changed in 1964, when an 8-AAAA conference ruling barred live animals from the football field.

A uniform, like that of the Louisiana State University Mascot, was ordered from New York and arrived in time for the football game on September 25, 1964.

Naming the Tiger then became an exciting prospect. The Tiger Times staff ran a contest to help the Tiger mascot get a name. The name finally decided upon was "Trochia," which meant "atrocious." Trochia practiced with the Pep Squad and cheerleaders, and had to go to summer camp just like other spirit club members.

In 2014, a second mascot, Titus, was revealed during Homecoming week. Students nominated potential names for the new male mascot and the top five names were voted on by the student community. Titus, nominated by Robert Hoover (THS Class of 2015) was the overall favorite.




